## MMPI-A & MMPI-A-RF PRACTICE CASES

Practice Case: Hailey

Hailey completed the MMPI-A as part of a comprehensive assessment at a residential treatment center. She was referred for evaluation by family services after she was expelled from school. The referring agency thought an evaluation would help identify appropriate interventions for Hailey to participate in. Both the MMPI-A and the MMPI-A-RF score reports were derived from this same test administration.

Hailey is a 15-year-old Biracial (White- and Black-American) girl. She is an only child and was raised primarily by her biological parents. Hailey had a stressful childhood due to her parents' use of drugs and inconsistent supervision. Hailey was involved with family services on several occasions for neglect. Hailey described being in therapy multiple times for stress related to these circumstances. She thought she had been diagnosed with "depression." Hailey's father died of a drug overdose when she was 13. At age 14, Hailey began living with an aunt because her mother was imprisoned for drug-related charges. Hailey reported disliking living with her aunt and Hailey's aunt described her as being "hard to manage."

At the time she was expelled, Hailey was in the 10<sup>th</sup> grade. Hailey achieved good marks in school until the 9th grade. Hailey said she "stopped caring" about school. Hailey had longstanding problems with school attendance and was suspended from school in the last year for smoking marijuana on school grounds and for disrupting the classroom by socializing. Hailey had also been in trouble with the law. Her legal record indicated she had been arrested for vandalizing property, shoplifting, and marijuana possession. Hailey said she smoked marijuana approximately one time a week, and she denied any other use of substances.

Hailey denied having any current difficulties with her mental health, though she said she felt sad when she thought about her parents. Hailey said the most important thing in her life was her friends. Hailey thought her friends were likely a bad influence because they frequently were in trouble for using drugs, stealing, and fighting. Hailey was in a long-term romantic and sexual relationship with a boy from her school. Hailey's aunt reported Hailey frequently sneaked out of the house at night to attend parties with her boyfriend.

Hailey was cooperative but needed several breaks to complete the test. She reported being motivated to complete the test because she thought it might "get people off my back." Hailey's MMPI-A-RF Profile








